# **Delightful Gems**

This article continues our series that focuses on past and present businesses in our community. This month we are focusing on former businesses at 337 – 339 South Fremont Ave.

The building dates to the 1890's and originally housed a seafood packing plant called The John T. McNaney Oyster Company. Fremont Ave. was originally called Cove Street, a bustling, north-south route for the commercial fishing industry in the young City of Baltimore. Therefore 337 - 339 S. Fremont Ave. was the perfect location for a small, family-owned packing business. Here, Chesapeake Bay oysters were shucked, cleaned, and canned for both local consumption and national distribution on the lower floors, while John T. McNaney and his family lived upstairs.

After 1945, the building became a warehouse for Samuel T. Epstein and Sons, a local department store chain. The warehouse served two nearby stores, one at 755 Washington Blvd and one at 2008 W. Pratt Street in West Baltimore. The Epstein Department stores closed in 1962 and the building was transferred to Zenith Lighting, Incorporated, a commercial supplier and manufacturer of lighting equipment. Zenith Lighting, Incorporated, was in operation at this location for over 30 years before closing their doors.

Many perspective owners have been drawn to this building due to its intricate exterior woodwork, including the detailed dentil tooth molding. The National Register of Historic Places noted, "the brickwork and detail are extremely fine, the façade composition is of a quality rarely exceeded in West Baltimore, sophisticated and in scale with the neighborhood – a remarkable late Victorian brick adaptation of an Italian Palazzo for commercial use". Only time will tell what will be the next chapter in the life of this Ridgely's Gem.

## **Crime Prevention Tips**

The Baltimore City Police Department needs our help to reduce crime in our neighborhood. Please review the following simple, yet effective home safety tips. All of us working together can make an impact:

- Illuminate the perimeter of your house.
- Use light timers throughout the house that have variable time changes, while you are away.
- Secure an attached garage as you would your house; it is an access point into your home.
- Secure window air conditioners to prevent them from being pulled out or pushed in.
- Consider investing in an alarm system. They are available in different price ranges and may make you eligible for an insurance discount.

#### **Protect Your Bike**

Bike theft is one of the more common crimes in Baltimore City. You can reduce your chances of becoming a victim by following a few simple steps:

- Secure your bike in the garage overnight with the door closed and locked.
- Lock your bike and both wheels to an immovable object that cannot be cut or broken.
- Use a good quality-locking device, such as a hardened steel "U" shaped lock or a hardened steel chain and padlock.
- Take a photograph of your bike, to include the serial number. Etch a personal ID onto the bike frame if you cannot locate the serial plate.

## **Prevent Theft from Automobiles**

Unfortunately, all of us have seen the disheartening sight of shattered auto glass on a city sidewalk. Some of these incidences could have been prevented by following two tips:

- Lock your car doors and close your windows. *Thieves target unlocked vehicles.*
- Do not leave valuables in your car. *Thieves like* to "window shop".

# Free Housing Resource in Baltimore City


Baltimore Neighborhoods, Inc. (BNI) is a nonprofit organization that operates a Fair Housing program and a Tenant-Landlord program. BNI operates a Tenant-Landlord Hotline, 410-243-6007, Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Their counselors provide impartial information on local laws, *not* legal advice, to tenants and landlords throughout Maryland.

They commonly address questions about security deposits, essential services, rent escrow, evictions, and much more. The Tenant-Landlord department also participates in community education activities and sells useful publications such as legal guides and sample legal documents for landlords. # Neighborhood Trivia

Each month we post a neighborhood trivia guestion, with the answer published in the following month's Ridgely's Record. Last month's trivia question was, "Who was Barney Farnham, the gentleman who the neighborhood honored by dedicating the Conway Park Rose Garden?" The answer: Barney Farnham was a retired Episcopal Rector who moved to Ridgely's Delight in 1998. Barney Farnham had been a rector at the Memorial Episcopal Church in Bolton Hill for 29 years and lived in a home owned by the church, with his wife Suzanne and their four children. One night they walked through our neighborhood after attending a gathering at the Babe Ruth Museum and found a "boarded up wreck" on South Paca St. They knew they had found their new Baltimore City residence. Working with the Maryland Historic Trust, they spent a year and close to \$100,000, to restore their new home. Barney and Suzanne Farnham spent their retirement bettering the lives of their new neighbors and meaningfully improving our neighborhood.

This month's trivia question is, "Quigley's Half Irish Pub, at 633 Portland Street, has been a staple in our neighborhood for over 10 years. What was the name of the bar that Quigley's replaced?"
