Parking Permit Renewal

Your residential parking permit and visitor's pass will expire on Friday, 30 June 2017. If you do not have a new permit or pass on your car as of 1 July 2017, you will be subject to a ticket. Ridgely's residents can visit our website at www.ridgelysdelight.org/parking for the link to renew permits and passes through the iParq system. The iParq system should be available beginning on Saturday, 20 May 2017 and will end on Friday, 9 June 2017. If you are having problems with the registration process, contact the Parking Authority office at 443-573-2800. First time permits and passes must be picked up at the Parking Authority office, 200 W. Lombard Street, Suite B. The office will be open one weeknight and one Saturday during the renewal period. Those dates will be published in the June newsletter once they are available.

This article continues our new series that focuses on past and present businesses in our community. This month we are meeting with Matthew Hilldoerfer, REALTOR® ABR, GRI, SRS, Keller Williams Legacy.

The Ridgely's neighborhood would love to thank you for your generous support of the Children's Easter Egg Hunt last month. The event highlighted the growing number of families in the neighborhood. As a longtime resident, what other changes have you seen in the Ridgely's Delight and Pigtown neighborhoods in the last 10 years?

Pigtown Main Street is doing a fantastic job at retaining businesses that are good for both Ridgely's and Pigtown. Breaking Bread got voted the "Best Wings" in the Best of Baltimore 2016. I had an amazing fig and goat cheese sandwich at Culinary Architecture the other day. Café Jovial and Chicken and Waffles are always serving up excellent food. Sunny's has great take out Chinese Food and Ebenezer Ethiopian Restaurant has an impressive menu too. There is something for every palate.

We like to hear stories about what brought neighbors to Ridgely's Delight. What brought you here to our neighborhood?

Northrop Grumman recruited me for my IT skills in 2004. I was also earning my MBA from Loyola University. They put me up in a hotel and gave me a chance to find a home. I looked at the Baltimore Sports and Social Club website and saw an ad for a room so I decided to settle in Ridgely's Delight. Ridgely's is the best location if you work south of the city. You have easy access to I-95, I-395, and US Route 1. But when I moved in, I just saw my neighbors go from their cars into their houses. I wanted to meet everyone so I took an evening job at Capoochino's Cafe, a coffee shop that was in the space currently housing DBFA. I learned that this was a very active neighborhood with a great community feel. We have Happy Hours, Movies in the Park, monthly meetings and Easter Egg Hunts.

Why did you decide to become a real estate agent?

My job as an IT professional allowed me to travel a lot. I lived in Brazil for six months and traveled to Azerbaijan, Dubai, South Africa and about 5 other countries, but the job wasn't really satisfying. At the time, I already owned my house on Washington Blvd and was closing on my house in Pigtown. I knew I loved the real estate market. So, after a brief stint of trying to develop an app, I got my real estate license in September 2014. I sold 8 houses in 2015, 26 houses in 2016 and have a goal of helping 60 families and investors find houses this year. Baltimore has 272 neighborhoods and I focus on Ridgely's and Pigtown, as each neighborhood is different. We build a foundation with our clients. Buying or selling your home is probably the biggest financial decision a person makes. I want to help as many people as I can make a comfortable decision. I care more than just for that transaction; I want a customer for life.

What unique qualities do you think Ridgely's has compared to other neighborhoods in Baltimore?

The founding fathers of Ridgely's had a vision which helped transform the neighborhood. For example, the tot lot transformation is really cool. It provides a safe place for children to play and deters negative activity from happening in our great open space. It is now a gathering place for families. Conway Park is a wonderful space to walk dogs, watch movies and play ball. Of course, we are so close to the stadiums. You can hear the home run horn from any house in the neighborhood. Everything the city has to offer is just an Uber ride or walk away.

Have you learned of any new hidden gems in or around our neighborhood that you would like to share?

The new Cheat Day Restaurant, in the space that used to house Shakers, is here to stay. They have a great menu which caters to the local tastes of both Pigtown and Ridgely's Delight.

Dandelions, Milkweed and Crabgrass, oh my!

Do you have Dandelions or Milkweed growing between your brick pavers or even between the cracks of your sidewalk where nothing but a weed could manage to grow? Weeds have deep roots and are often difficult to remove or kill completely. If you want to avoid pesticides and go organic, head for your pantry. Use a little bit of baking soda and the weeds are sent to their final resting place. Sprinkle handfuls of baking soda over the tops of weeds growing in the cracks of driveways and sidewalks. Sweep any spilled baking soda into the cracks. This remedy works best when the weeds are isolated from desired plants and grass, as baking soda may kill favored plants too. Stubborn weeds may need a retreatment in four to six weeks.

Neighborhood Trivia

A portion of our neighborhood was built on land that was part of Rachael Howard's Dowry. So, last month's trivia question was, "Who did Rachael Howard marry?" The answer: Colonel Charles Ridgely acquired the open land, southwest of the city's original boundaries, in 1667 when he married Rachael Howard. Rachel Howard was the daughter of Captain John Howard Jr. and Mary (Warfield) Howard. In 1732, this land, originally known as Howard's Timberneck, was combined with another property known as Brotherly Love, resurveyed and named Ridgely's Delight.
